From little things . . .

There was a poignant moment for me several years ago, that brought home the bitter joy of arriving on a new horizon of life. Mary, a beautiful and slightly reserved young Sudanese lady had arrived in our community just a few days beforehand. In her limited English, she communicated her great relief and gratitude that she had a place to call home. It had been a journey of 15 years. And yet, she was troubled. Troubled to the point that she shed tears, day and night; that she could not sleep; that she would not eat. I was to discover that the root of this paradox was her guilt. Her fear for her young brothers, orphaned just a few months beforehand, and now left in the care of an uncle. Mary's struggle is not atypical – for so many of the refugees that we welcome to our home, behind them there are many others, mothers, sisters and brothers, and even children, who yearn for the same glimpse of light, just a moment of security and hope for the intimate warmth of their own home. Last week, after four years of determination, prayer, and gritty sense of hope, Mary wrapped her arms around her twelve year old twin brothers as they walked up the ramp of Lismore airport. It was testimony to her love, and indeed her hope, that the broader community of

Lismore continues to open its heart to those on the margins of the global community. I must thank all who continue to show their faith in Sanctuary Northern Rivers. We are continued to be blessed with an



abundance of goodwill and commitment from the community. This last year has not been an easy one. The demand from refugees from all corners of the world grows tremendously; the advocacy and support for these, in addition to the support and programs that grows for those settled with us already, exacts a demanding workload on all involved. The cost of this is frequently borne by those in the community, who quietly voice support, lend a hand, and yet hear little in return. We have not forgotten you! We have been busy building – an enthusiastic board and subcommittees, an office, a support worker, and a website . . . with still much more to do. The benefits of this work are already evident. However, we expect in the coming months to make up for the lack of communication, to present more visibly the toil that has been happening, and to grow into the eminent charity that so many have trusted us to be.

We have been blessed during the last month with the arrival of one family from Eritrea joining their sister in Lismore, a young 6 year old, who showed his sheer delight in being re-united with his mother after two years separation; We welcomed Etienne, a young Congolese man, and of course, Nhial and Ngor, the 12 year old twin brothers of Mary.

There are many more aspiring refugees in the pipeline. This months, there have been five family units called up for interviews, all African. It is our hope that they are successful in the stage of their application – the door seems almost open for them, and they are all very excited. I received word from one:

"We are really happy myself, my fiancee, my brother and my sister to get the result from the Australia interview which was on 17 March 2009, it was really okay and we received the Medical examination Letter. We really thank for your support in our life may God bless you and your family".

We have about 70 others, who are at various stages in the application process, let us hope for some measure of success for these also.

Universal Declaration of Human Rights Project

2008 saw the 60th anniversary of the signing of the UN's Universal Declaration of Human Rights come and go – with minimal fanfare and



with many Australians still very much unaware of what the Universal Declaration says and what rights it advocates.

In 2008, group of local seniors instigated a project to donate a wall hanging depicting the Universal Declaration of Human Rights to local schools. The hanging, over 1m x 1.6m would be permanently displayed in a public place within the school.

The Sanctuary Board endorsed the project last year, thereby giving it tax deductibility status. Several schools have taken up

the offer of the hanging to date. We are keen to promote the offer to other schools across the region during 2009. Each wall hanging costs between \$120 and \$200.
